#### ARIZONA GOVERNOR VETOES TAKEOVER BILL

Gov. Jan Brewer refused to sign into law legislation that demanded title to some 48,000 square miles of federal lands in her state. The public lands bill, which parallels one recently passed in Utah, was sponsored by state senator Al Melvin (R-Tucson). Like many Western states, a substantial portion of Arizona – more than 40 percent – is owned or controlled by the federal government. Melvin's bill would have required the transfer of all federal lands to the state with the exception of military bases and parklands. While describing herself as a "staunch advocate" for state sovereignty, Gov. Brewer wrote, "We still must be mindful and respectful of our federal system." Read more HERE.



## RECORD-SETTING CONSERVATION EASEMENTS TO PROTECT 67,347 ACRES.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will pay Lyme Timber Company \$17.3 million in two separate transactions to extinguish development rights on more than 100 square

miles of forestland in the northwest corner of the state. According to published reports, the property straddles the Great Lakes and Mississippi River watersheds and will be known as the Brule-St. Croix Legacy Forest. ## LUCAS CONSIDERS LOW-INCOME HOUSING FOR GRADY RANCH.

After waging a prolonged battle with his neighbors over construction of a film studio in Marin County, filmmaker George Lucas has withdrawn plans to build a 260,000- square-foot production facility.

Lucas is now working with the Marin Community Foundation to explore other uses for the land, including affordable and senior living communities. Critics of the plans say that it is unlikely construction would be possible in what they consider an environmentally sensitive area, but the land already happens to be zoned for residential construction.
